

Building Bridges between Greece and Diaspora

NEW YORK – Not everyone ends up in the field they first fall in love with, but some childhood interests bolster chances of success in any profession by fostering teamwork and discipline. Yanna Darilis, for years a popular TV host in Greece and now the President of New Greek TV (NGTV), was an athlete from a young age and her experiences served her well.

Energy and seriousness are there too, now as then. Regarding the origins of the power to charm she picked up along the way as a fashion model and television host, one can inquire with her parents.

In August, 2012, the late Demetris Kastanas who was a Greek-American TV pioneer, sold his TV program, National Greek Television to a group of Greek-Americans. Darilis was one of the driving forces.

“I heard it was for sale and spoke to friends about it. Andrew Latos, and our beloved Peter Latos who passed away,” and others, including George Stephanopoulos, the entertainment attorney and film producer who handled the acquisition, got together and decided “lets buy the channel and continue this.”

Calling Kastanas a legend, she said “he did a wonderful job helping to keep Hellenism strong in the United States,” and NGTV wants to continue bringing in quality programs from Greece, but they also prioritize creating local programming for the community in Greek and to reach out in English to the new generations.

She and the new owners are working as a team to take a community institution to the next level.

It is a challenging endeavor. The community is a complex demographic – Darilis agrees there are many varieties of Greek-Americans – and the language question poses programming challenges.

Creativity and vision will be needed, and that is on her resume too. Darilis is one of the few female hosts who became an executive producer in Greece.

In many ways, her upbringing was unremarkable – except perhaps in what matters most. “I grew up in a big family full of love. My parents are wonderful human beings – Nitsa and Costa. It was a traditional Greek home,” she said. Her mother’s mother Evangelia was there too and she has two younger sisters, Lisa and Angie, and an older brother Andreas.

“They raised us with the Greek spirit, in the community,” said the woman who grew up in Jamaica Estates and Bayside, and earned degrees from Queens College, where she has taught, and Empire State University.

She had a balanced upbringing, with both Greek and “American” friends, spending time with

friends in Astoria during college.

Her childhood was shaped more by the athletic world than the Greek-American community, and that’s what propelled her to Greece at the age of 24.

Darilis was brought over to Greece to be a middle and high school physical education teacher and basketball coach at the American Community School – she had done that previously at St. Demetrios in Astoria and St. Francis Prep.

In 1994 she was jet-skiing in Greece “and Antenna TV found me – I didn’t even know who they were.” Antenna was a media pioneer in Greece, among the first privately owned channels.

Vasilis Tsvilikas the actor and Antenna’s host was at the beach that day with the producers and saw her.

TNH asked, “Did they just look up and see this blonde streak across the water?” “Yes!” she said.

Darilis said, “They invited be to the studio but I didn’t want a career in television.” She told them “I’m a coach and teacher,” and they replied “you can always teach, but you can’t always be on television.”

She called her practical electrical engineer dad for advice and after getting the O.K. she thought she would try it out for a year.

HELLO GREECE – HELLO?

When she first arrived, from a very sheltered Greek-American home, it was very hard for her to understand the Greek mentality. “Living in Greece, with a completely different mindset and way

of doing things, was a culture shock for me,” she said.

Most of her friends in the U.S. “back in the day were getting married right out of school and having children, and I wasn’t ready to do that.”

“Did I want a career in television – no it happened completely by accident. Do I want a family – yes, it just hasn’t happened for me yet.”

She took the Antenna job. Being introduced as a fitness expert and doing the news in English for Antenna Satellite, Greek fluency was not necessary at first, but she worked hard to develop it.

Darilis was thrilled to convey to the world “the persons that were making a difference” and “all the things that were happening in Greece” that the diaspora was not aware of.

By the time she got to Star Channel she was doing an array of things: fitness modeling, fashion modeling on runways and in catalogs, but she fell in love with presenting the news. “It was a life-changing experience.”

Seven years down the line, a well-established TV host and discovering she enjoyed the creative dimension of television production; Darilis wanted a stronger foundation for her work. She went back to college and got a degree in film and television from New York College in Athens, Greece. She had great professors, including film maker Panatelas Vulgarism.

That was followed by what she called an amazing experi-

ence: hosting Hellenic Weekly , the first English language magazine show in Greece airing on ERT Satellite. She is proud of the 70 travel pieces she wrote, directed and hosted that were essentially mini documentaries.

KISSED BY THE GODS

She was also selected to co-host the opening and closing ceremonies of the Athens Olympics. “It was a great honor...I spoke in Greek, English and a little bit of French.”

Darilis said the ancients said Olympic Games participants were kissed by the gods. As a host in 2004, “I was kissed by the gods.” She also was thrilled “to be able to meet and work with a lot of wonderful and talented people, including Yianni Angelopoulou-Daskalakis.”

She also wrote an exercise book in Greece titled “Agapitos to Soma Sass – Love Your Body,” because she says that’s “people have to learn to appreciate themselves and what God has given them.”

YOU CAN GO HOME AGAIN, BUT THERE’S A PRICE

“Once you go abroad to live, you feel like you are now torn. You do not know where you belong,” she told TNH. She said one wonders, “Do I belong to Greece or do I belong in America – I’m right smack in the middle.”

In 2005 she felt it was time to come home. “My family was here, I’m a Greek-American, though I say now that I am a Greek from America because I’ve changed. Living in Greece and travelling around Europe has changed me as a person in general.”

“I feel it is important to continue working for Hellenism on all levels and among the new generations,” she said, adding that her Orthodox faith and spirituality are also important to her.

After ERT Satellite, she began to think that she can do that kind of program in the States for Greek-Americans, and she helped make it happen with NGTV, which is on Channel 545 Time-Warner Cable

They are in the process of expanding to other platforms like Dish and Verizon but Darilis noted that subscribers must contact those companies and request NGTV – “That’s the best way to help us.”

NGTV has news from Greece all day but there is also a Greek language newscast that presents the news from Greece, American national and local news and community news. There is a medical program in Greek called “Sto Vima Tou Ippokratou – In the Steps of Hippocrates” in Greek hosted Dr. Konstantinos Pletis of Lenox Hill hospital and a law program in Greek and English hosted by Andrew Latos.

They are also getting requests for a Greek news program in English, which they are developing.

She is thrilled with the staff, which includes Dimitrios Fillipi-des, who does general reporting and hosts “Ora tou Politi – the Citizen’s Hour.”

Torn between presenting the show in Greek or English, they decided to use both on their new one and a half hour-long morning show, Kalimera USA that airs every Friday at 10 AM and is rerun on Saturday at 10 AM.

They are in the final stages of developing a website, newgreek-television.com, which will premier in September. It will have a web channel on it featuring all their programs, but their cable contract does not allow them to do live streaming.

GNTV’s mission is to unite Greece and the United States and connect with the new generation of viewers, whom they invite to become direct participants. Darilis wants programs and coverage to extend to the community’s youth programs such as the Joy and GOYA chapters of parishes across the country.

“We want the new generations on television...Send us your videos. We would love to feature them on the website,” she said.

They are trying to provide what people are asking for. Some viewers want them to continue to present program from multiple Greek channels, but the licensing agreement doesn’t permit that. She also noted that the economic crisis has reduced the number of new programs and series being produced, but they have an agreement with SKY, which they are excited about.

Darilis is currently writing a fitness book in English called Forever Young. She told TNH that in her down time she paints, enjoys film, theater, museums, live music, and travelling. Sounds like there is not much down in her down time either.

She lives in Manhattan but delights in nature, and loves reading, including traditional newspapers. “I’m a hard copy girl. I love to sit down with my paper and a cup of coffee over the weekend in Central Park and go through the Times – and The National Herald.”

She also considers promoting and advertising Greece a hobby. “I feel we are all responsible to represent Greece.”
